SYLLABUS STATEMENT: The purpose of this document is to provide clarity about clerkship expectations. Consider using this document as a guide for this clerkship, and to provide transparency and accountability for all.

CLERKSHIP DESCRIPTION:

The goal of the Psychiatry Clerkship is to prepare medical students to recognize, diagnose, and care for patients with psychiatric disorders encountered in most medical practices. Students will be assigned to work with interdisciplinary teams which will aid the student in meeting course objectives. Students will be assigned patients and will follow their clinical progression in-hospital. Students will attend teaching rounds and a variety of teaching conferences. Each student will be required to view a series of lecture recordings or attend in person didactics and complete a clinical case report at their individual teaching sites.

CLERKSHIP OUTLINE AND CONTENT:

Mid-Clerkship Review: Students will receive day to day feedback from their preceptor on their clinical performance. It is the responsibility of the student to seek out mid-term feedback via the mid-clerkship CSA. It is expected during your psych clerkship rotation that you will encounter each of these <u>4 unique RCE conditions</u>. During your mid-clerkship review, please discuss these conditions and ways you can meet these requirements.

PATIENT HISTORY & CLINICAL EXAM EXPECTATIONS:

Students are expected to perform histories and physical examinations at levels that are appropriate to their experience level, particularly as it is expected their skills will grow throughout the clerkship. The levels of performance are assessed using the EPA forms.

Assignment/Assessment List

- 1. <u>Active Learning Series Recordings/Live Didactics Attendance</u> Students will attest to one of 3 options: viewed/listened to all the Active Learning Series content on the Canvas site or attended didactics in person at their site per individual site policy, or attended 70% of the HCMC didactics remotely.
- 2. <u>Quality Improvement & Patient Safety</u> As a small group, please write an AIM statement that would prevent or reduce the chances of the safety issue in the future that someone from your team was involved in, or witnessed, while on your psychiatry rotation. Alternatively, write an AIM statement that would help you figure out the source of the problem and/or help direct you to a solution, such as doing a process map of a system.
- 3. <u>UWorld Quiz</u> Complete 60 assigned UWorld questions to help prepare you for the Step exam. Attest to completion.
- 4. <u>History of Psychiatry Project</u> Students will use real historical patient data to practice a patient handoff and reflect on how psychiatric care has changed over the last 2 centuries.
- 5. <u>Faculty Evaluations Attestation</u> Students are required to complete at least 1 evaluation on Medtrics of preceptors they work with (this could be a resident or an attending). Attest to completion.
- 6. <u>Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) Short Responses</u> Students will review three resources of their choosing from a list of DEI resources. They are required to submit several short answer responses per resource and one final survey to provide feedback on the assignment as a whole. Students will also meet in person once at their site during the clerkship to discuss these DEI topics.
- 7. <u>Required Clinical Experiences</u> Students will encounter and experience the 4 required conditions required of this Clerkship per U of M Medical School policy.

8. <u>Entrustable Professional Activities</u> - Students will complete 3 EPAs per week of the clerkship as dictated by the University of Minnesota Medical School (meaning 12 total EPAs completed by the end of the Clerkship)..

9. <u>Clinical Skills Assessment</u> - A Final CSA will be completed by an attending assessing the student's skills near the end of the clerkship. Additional CSAs will be completed during the mid clerkship meeting or other times of the clerkship and can be completed by attendings, fellows, and residents but only the final CSA will be used for grading purposes.

- 10. Case Report The student is required to complete one clinical case report. It will be graded based on this rubric.
 - Present a patient case report which is unique or unusual and/or presents important educational or scientific
 knowledge in the field of psychiatry. You will present a discussion and analysis of the case study that
 facilitates an understanding of disease, diagnosis and treatment. It needs to be organized, clear, focused,
 and utilizes appropriate primary literature sources.
